COURSE SYLLABUS

I. Course Catalog Description

An orientation course to equip learners with skills for vocational discernment and readiness for ministry education. As they explore the various forms of ministry practice historically and today, learners will investigate their own sense of calling and will develop an understanding of the opportunities and challenges that may arise during the educational process and their chosen career. Course must be taken within the first twelve credit hours of the program.
