IV. Course Policies

Students are expected to read and abide by the course policies.

Course Late Policy: For online classes: Regular, systematic, weekly participation is required by all online students. More than two weeks of nonparticipation in one six week period is considered unacceptable and may result in a lower grade for the course. Work completed late must be discussed with the instructor more than 24 hours before it is due to be accepted for partial credit. When accepted late, a 10% deduction per day will be imposed on the total score earned.
